If it can be said this way: The First Epiphany was to be had by Three Kings after a star-studded journey to the mangerside of God incarnate. These were not your average desert-trekkers pursuing a geocaching hobby, but learned astrologer -astronomers prompted by international government to seek out what possible threat could be emerging yonder. Turns out, the Kings had a profound revelation in the stable, shaken to the core by a sense of Divine; visited by an angel, no less, who told them to "return home another way" to avoid reporting their findings to Herod.



- ✓ Work is also proceeding to upgrade our church door security system and install a parking lot surveillance system — expect completion in the early spring.



MLK Day of Service

S aint Bartholomew's has traditionally observed the Martin Luther King Day of remembrance as a "day on" for community service, not a "day off"

holiday. This year we bring back our traditional food drive for the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center on MLK day – Monday, January 16, 2023. On that day, we partner with our local neighborhoods and other 40 West churches to fill the pantry in our undercroft – our goal this year is 3000 pounds. In order to get the word out and make it easy for the local neighborhoods to donate, we will again be delivering nearly 1000 empty grocery bags with fliers attached a week in advance, and then return to pick them up on MLK day.

This event requires a lot of up-front planning and work, and plenty of volunteer opportunities for the congregation. These are the ways you can help:

- Sunday, January 1st. Help us staple the fliers to bags. We need 10 volunteers willing to spend about 20 minutes on this task, in the Parish House right after the 10:30 service on January 1st.
- Sunday, January 8th. Help us deliver the empty bags to doorsteps in the local neighborhoods. We will need 15-20 volunteers willing to spend about 30 minutes on this task – pick up 50 bags

after either service on January 8th, and use supplied maps, routes and instructions for delivery over the next few days. There will be

coordinators in the Parish House on the 8^{th} to assist you with any questions or concerns.

3. Sunday, January 8th or 15th. Pick up a bag in the Parish House for yourself to return to the undercroft on MLK day. These bags will be available for pickup after either service.

4. Monday, January 16th is the Big Day! Between 9:30 am and noon, help us return to the local neighborhoods to retrieve the now filled grocery bags. We will need about 25 volunteers for this, as we travel out in groups of two or three to complete this task. There will be coordinators in the undercroft to supply maps, routes, and instructions for pickups.

A December to Remember

Our Board of Directors is very pleased to announce that William H. Webster is our new Director, effective January 1, 2023 — a wonderful way to begin the new year! Bill is a social worker who retired in 2020 with 16 years of experience as a case manager, supervisor, and as direct support staff, providing support to people with intellectual disabilities, and 8 years of experience working for a West Baltimore congregation with a focus on mission activities.

He has a MA in church ministries and a BAS in computer systems, and had a 20-year career developing and designing complex computer systems. He has served on multiple boards — including 40 West Assistance and Referral Center many years ago! — and currently serves on the Community Advisory Committee for the Maryland Center on Developmental Disabilities at Kennedy Krieger. He is enthusiastic about our Center, its mission and working with our volunteers serving our neighbors, and is looking forward to his role as Director. His years of experience in the realm of mission and ministry will gift our organization with a heart for our mission: to provide, with compassion, the basic necessities of life to neighbors in need. We joyously welcome him aboard!

December has been a busy month at our Center:

On December 8 and 12, we held our monthly federal food distribution program — "The Emergency Food Assistance Program" (TEFAP). With this federally supplied food and our pantry's extra donations, we gave out 1656 pounds of food to 76 families.

On December 12, after our pantry closed for regular hours, parents came in to receive the Angel Tree Gifts for their children. We are delighted to report that gifts were provided for 121 children from 44 families! St. Bartholomew's parishioners provided 66 of those gifts and other member churches of 40 West, and friends and neighbors of our Center, provided 55 gifts. Parents were so appreciative of all of our efforts to provide their children with something under the tree from Santa! So many parents shared their stories, their thankfulness at receiving the gifts with tears and joy.

We have been busy stocking our shelves as the grant from the Maryland Food Bank (MFB), and the grant from the Catonsville Women's Giving Circle, end as of December 31. We are truly grateful for the generosity of the Maryland Food Bank for providing free food through their various grants for pantries in Maryland. It has made the difference to us and to our neighbors who need this food. On December 8, our food pick-up team brought us a delivery of 1682 pounds of food and goods for our pantry shelves, plus the TEFAP food. On December 14, our food pick-up team brought us 3256 pounds of food and goods, and on December 20, another 3450 pounds of food and goods. And speaking of our "Pick-Up Team" - the picture shows Gretchen and Dan Parry and Marilyn and Larry Henderson, who delivered the most recent deliveries.



Gretchen is a former Board member and coordinates her teams when our Food Manger Susan Lundin places our orders. Also often helping with food deliveries to 40 West is Bobby Young, brother of Tony Young, who volunteers weekly in our front office.

And speaking of food and goods deliveries, here is a picture of some of our volunteers – Susan Lundin, Peggy Dorsey and Amanda Harris helping to receive our delivery through our "Window Delivery System!"



On December 15, in the pouring rain, we held our Christmas Meal Distribution. Even with the cold and wet weather, some hardy folks waited in their cars to receive a turkey and box of side items provided to 40 West by the Maryland Food Bank, plus another full bag of extra food and a bag of potatoes from 40 West. We set up tents to serve those waiting in cars and invited our neighbors who walked or arrived by public transit to come into the Parish House to receive their Christmas meals. The weather on Thursday kept many of our neighbors at home, but we finished distributing the meals on Friday and Monday. We gave away 76 bountiful meals totaling 3724 pounds for these Holiday Meals. I want to give a huge THANK YOU to all our volunteer staff who helped with the Thanksgiving Meals – outside directing parking, giving out tickets, helping with registration informative, moving prepacked bags from the Parish House to the tents, putting the meals in cars, and our food pick up crew who brought us the food – 40 West is blessed to have such dedicated volunteers who were not going to let rain and cold weather hinder their purpose to give out food to those in need.

Also, we are continuing to meet with Dave Murray and Nancy Nicaise, Project Jigsaw co-chairs, 40 West leadership, and architect Jerome Gray and project managers as we plan for our new street level handicap access door! It will be wonderful to not have to receive deliveries via the window, and to know that our neighbors will have easier access to our Center. Thankfully, we have some state grants to help with the cost of this project.

With St. Bartholomew's Outreach Committee, we are beginning to make plans to resume the MLK Food Drive on January 16, 2023. We hope to distribute bags in the neighborhood, asking folks to fill the bags with cans and boxes of food to stock our pantry shelves, so that we can continue to provide food to our neighbors with your help.

As the year 2022 comes to a close, I am privileged to see, and know, what a difference <u>we</u> make in the lives of our neighbors. I am blessed beyond measure to be able to serve in this ministry <u>with</u> you. <u>You</u> all are a part of this ministry. We could not do what we do without your help.
