S t. Bartholomew's is rolling out an exciting new music program for our community – the Choir School of West Baltimore, led by Dr. Ted Davis, our Organist-Choirmaster. You may have heard about our first event in 2022 – a three-day summer Choir Camp, which had about 12 participants and enjoyed strong support from St. B's parishioners and beyond.

We are now offering CSWB classes every Sunday from 12:00 noon to 1:00 pm, open to kids in grades 3-8. As enrollment grows we plan to offer a second class during the week. Students are learning about musical notation and sight reading, vocal production, song structure, and more!

We are off to a great start with a small but mighty group that has been singing together since October 2022. Plans for this year include:

- Social events about once per month, starting with a pizza lunch and cookie baking event on Saturday, February 11th;
- Opportunities to sing in the 10:30 service;
- Another Choir Camp, tentatively slated for July 2023;
- Community-based concerts;
- Piano instruction for interested students.

Some of these expanded activities we can only offer once our enrollment gets a bit larger — so we are actively recruiting now. We are continuing our outreach to community associations, schools, and churches in the area. If you know a child who likes to sing, please get in touch with us. Clergy Transition Update

Interim Rector

As the Wardens communicated in a letter to parish members, we have exciting news about our Interim Rector. The Vestry selected The Reverend Pan Conrad to be Interim Rector for St. Bartholomew's Church. Pan will serve from March 5 until we find our next Rector.

Pan comes to St. Bartholomew's with a fascinatingly varied background, a tangible enthusiasm for St. Bartholomew's, and a powerful commitment to ministry that we think will fit well with the blazing beacon that is St. B's. She has been Rector at St. Albans, Glen Burnie, for the past six years. She has a strong focus on racial justice and serves as chair of the Truth and Reconciliation Committee for the Diocese of Maryland. She has also been a national leader in the dialogue around science and faith, serving as the elected Warden of the Society of Ordained Scientists in North America. Before being called to ministry, she served as a NASA astrobiologist and helps to coordinate a team that guides the work of one of the Mar rovers. She also brings a passion for music, with degrees in composing and vocal performance. And, amongst many other interests, she holds a 3rd degree black belt in Shotokan Karate!

As we spoke with Pan, we were struck by her emphasis on collaborative ministry, her energy about celebrating the liturgy and preaching, her commitment to pastoral care and environmental stewardship, and her excitement about engaging children in the life of the church. We feel fortunate to have her with us as we navigate our path to finding a new Rector.

Flo's last day will be February 19. On February 26, The Reverend Canon Stuart Wright, Canon for Administration and Transitions Ministry for the Diocese, will celebrate liturgy with us. Pan's first Sunday will be March 5. Our own Reverend Thelma Smullen will conduct the Ash Wednesday liturgy on February 22 and will be available for any pastoral issues between February 19 and March 5.

Profile Committee Chairs

Our next step in the search process is to put together a parish profile, incorporating the input, vision, and ideas of the whole congregation, so that we can clearly discern what qualities we are looking for in a new Rector. This process will occur between now and this summer.

The profile is what will be circulated to potential candidates and will guide our discernment of candidates. We are delighted that the Vestry has identified three co-chairs of a Profile Committee to coordinate this process: Angel Jackson, Corinne Bowmaker, and Marty Clark. Angel and Corinne were the past two Senior Wardens, so they bring a broad knowledge of the complex ecosystem of faithful action that is St. B's. Corinne has also been deeply involved in our historical research. Marty has been a long-time leader in our youth groups, Men's Ministry, and many other activities. In addition, Amanda Harris has been appointed to fill out a Vestry vacancy created when Vestry member moved out of state. She will also serve on the Profile Committee and act as a liaison between that committee and the Vestry. If you see any of these folks, please thank them for their service!

The Profile Committee chairs will be working over the next month to fill out the membership of the Profile Committee to have a wide reaching representation of the various parts of our Parish life. If you are interested in participating in the Profile Committee, please let any of them know.

Remembering Fred

Fred Bolling 1/27/1947 - 12/10/2022

D id you know that in his younger days, Fred was known for his extraordinary dancing abilities? He could do full splits and spin completely around on the tips of his toes, "just like James Brown," said a lifelong friend at his home going.

Fred was known by everyone at St. B's as our faithful Sexton for over 30 years. It was a job he dearly loved. He was the one who opened the church every morning, kept us comfortably warm or cool, and helped deal with boiler emergencies whenever it decided to go on the fritz. He set up for meetings, Faith Forums, and meals in the Parish House. His favorite job was riding the mower to cut the grass, but he also shoveled plenty of snow. He knew every inch of every building, all the quirks of our infrastructure and how to fix them, and how to work ancient and new mechanisms. I know there were multitudes of small favors he did to help folks out. He was so helpful to me as a Senior Warden and as archivist, offering to haul boxes and equipment around for me. We depended on him for so much and he was always there. He was quiet about his love for St. B's, but if you'd talk to him about retiring he'd get teary.

Fred's greatest joy in life was to set off on a road trip, either by himself or corralling friends, sometimes at the last minute, to go with him. Sometimes he didn't know where he was setting off to. He loved to drive and he would just spontaneously go! He often visited family and friends in Florida and Virginia.

He was the DJ at all the parties with his big boombox and a cooler in the trunk for beer. I heard stories of his legendary parties. And he was always there for his friends when they needed him.

At his wake, his nephew told a hilarious story about how Fred was teaching him to box and knocked him clean out. He said when he regained consciousness, "He told me I should have dipped instead of ducked."

His favorite food was macaroni cheese with ham. Even at holiday meals with all the trimmings, that's all he wanted to eat.

As he became ill in his last years, he continued to work as long as possible. He didn't want any farewell ceremony when he retired.

Fred was a kind, stubborn, life-loving faithful son, brother, uncle, and cousin who dedicated much of his life to St. B's. For his service, his faithfulness to our faith community, and his friendship, we give thanks.



Thank You from My Brother's Keeper

Keeper, sends his heartfelt thank you to the parishioners of St. Bartholomew's for the "amazing benevolence and gracious generosity" which has helped to sustain their programs. He goes on to say that our support has remained a consistent resource to the residents of the Irvington community.

The current St. B's Outreach project at My Brother's Keeper started with the pandemic in 2020, when unable to provide prepared casseroles to support their lunch service, we moved to providing food and supplies to help them to keep their lunch service going. My Brother's Keeper has never stopped providing lunch. Whether a grab-and-go bag lunch or a take-away hot meal, they continue to offer lunch to the community 7 days a week.

That is in addition to the myriad other services that they continue to provide including onsite medical, mental, and behavioral health services, job placement and legal services. Community walks, bringing together community leaders and members of the community, were implemented in the summer of 2022 and due to the success of the activity, will resume in March of this year.

My Brother's Keeper is excited to announce that their hot meal service will resume in February. This allows guests to come inside, sit down in the dining room and enjoy a hot lunch. Our Outreach project to provide volunteers to help with lunch service, one Saturday a month, also ended in 2020 and has yet to resume. The good news is that My Brother's Keeper is finally able to begin to reintroduce volunteers onsite and will begin looking to expand that that program. Stay tuned for ways that parishioners can become involved in this rewarding ministry.

My Brother's Keeper is planning a Spring Festival for the community. Dates and other details about this celebration of the season are yet to be announced. Look for updates and plan to join our neighbors in celebrating.

"Bmore2gether" with KIVA

The mission of the KIVA Committee at St. Bartholomew's — "We loan because we want to help our global neighbors start, sustain, or expand a community-based business to alleviate poverty, especially among children and youth."

This month we have made loans that support women and their families, that bring financial inclusion to impacted areas of Columbia, smallholder farmers to purchase seeds and solar lanterns, and that is focused on the poorest 1/5 of the population with no access to financial services in Tajikstan. Read more about these young women below:



Columbia - Lilia Del Carmen:

Lilia del Carmen lives in Ipiales, Nariño and has been working as a farmer since she was 13 years old along with her family. With her extensive experience, Lilia has built her own potato crops on two-terrain, which she bought after more than 10 years in the business. Lilia's potato crops are highly productive thanks to the constant process of natural oxygenation that she performs regularly with the help of her sisters. Besides potatoes, Lilia also has a small batch of pea crops planted in her terrain, which she collects monthly along with her potato crops. Lilia is a single mother who lives with her three adult sons in a house she bought in her youth. Her sons work in different professions near their town and help her through the harvesting process during their free time.

Our loan helps Lilia to purchase a new stationary machine that will optimize the fertilization and irrigation of her potato and pea crops.



Kenya – Jerita's Group:

Jerita is the group leader of her group in Gem District, and she is representing 11 farmers, including herself. Jerita joined One Acre Fund for the first time this season, but she has been a farmer for more than 20 years.

Like many other farmers, Jerita decided to work with One Acre Fund in order to get the best quality fertilizer and hybrid seed. She hopes that by joining One Acre Fund and using the seed and fertilizer she will get with this loan, she can join the ranks of One Acre Fund farmers that have

doubled their harvest in their first year of the program.

Jerita plans to use the profits she earns from this year's harvest to send her children to school.

Jerita's Group will use the farming inputs received with this loan to cultivate a total of 7.4 acres of land. Additionally, some of the farmers in the group will be purchasing a solar light with this loan; the group will receive a total of 5 solar lights.

Ecuador – Alondra Mikaelo:

Alondra is a 23-year-old, very hardworking and responsible young woman. She lives in the city of Ibarra with her parents.

Alondra works selling mobile phones in the city of Ibarra in the Los Ceibos neighborhood. She is able to take advantage of her knowledge in the field of technology to sell mobile phones. She carries out this work with the goal of having an income and supporting herself as she begins her university studies. Alondra is asking for a KIVA loan to buy cell phones since the Christmas season is coming up. She wants to expand the variety of phones she offers because customers ask for new models.

Alondra is very grateful for KIVA's help since the increased income that the loan will help her to generate will improve the quality of her life.



Tajikstan – Ozodamoi:

Ozodamoi would like to express her gratitude for the support. She diligently put her loan to use. Ozodamoi would like to ask for support once more in order to buy ingredients to prepare flatbread. Ozodamoi is counting on your support. She believes in you.

The KIVA loan committee has chosen loans totaling \$94,425 since its start in 2015. Funding from St. Bartholomew's totals \$29,276 so about \$65,000 has been repaid and loaned back out. We have made 241 loans in 38 different countries. Donors and Volunteers: Icons of Help and Hope

As the new director of the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center, I'm grateful for this opportunity to briefly reflect on what 40 West has achieved in 2022, as well as how donors and volunteers bring help and hope to Baltimore City and the communities in West Baltimore, in particular.

Grants and partners often catch our attention because they are sources of large dollars amounts and offer access to large networks that help the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center achieve its mission. In local donors and volunteers, we can connect to the true heart and soul of the center.

In 2022, member churches, local businesses, and neighbors of 40 West donated 5,560 pounds of food. Individual donors provided 35 percent of food donations, member churches gave 36 percent, and local businesses contributed another 6 percent.

Individual monetary donations made up 38 percent of 40 West's income. Church and board members contributed over 43 percent.

Volunteers welcomed people in need to the 40 West Center, provided food and non-food assistance, and entered information needed to measure the success of 40 West's mission as well as to assess compliance with the expectations of our partners. Volunteers also delivered food from the Maryland Food Bank to the center, managed the food inventory, and continued to refine 40 West's procedures based on their experience to ensure those visiting 40 West for assistance are served in a pleasant, efficient, and effective manner.

40 West runs on time, talent and treasure that is freely given by a host of people who choose to live as members of the beloved community where one serves others with compassion. Even when they are away from the center, volunteers support the mission 40 West. For example, one volunteer has been known to plan the next food order while on vacation. Another seasoned volunteer, though not scheduled to work, answers calls at home from volunteers or the new director seeking guidance on how to help a neighbor in need of non-food assistance. Then, there are volunteers that help keep the IT infrastructure running and the physical plant operational when they are not engaged in their day jobs.

Accomplishments in 2022

Below is a summary of what donors and volunteers accomplished through 40 West with the assistance of partners in 2022. These are amazing numbers that indicate just how substantial 40 West's support is to Baltimore City and the neighborhoods close to St. Bartholomew's.

Food

- Households received food from 40 West 3,852 times. 127,269 pounds of food were distributed.
- 105.972 meals were distributed.
- 178 Giant Food Cards were distributed.

Non-Food

\$3,748 dollars of 40 West funds were distributed for BGE, Eviction, Shelter and Pharmacy assistance.

388 Bus Tokens were distributed.

On each visit, clients may choose up to five clothing and other non-food items displayed near the 40 West entrance. Currently, 40 West does not track and document clothing donations; however, many clients look forward to browsing and taking a few items when they visit.

Referrals

These numbers do not reflect the benefits neighbors received from referrals 40 West routinely makes to other agencies, pantries, and offices. Also, 40 West does not track the funds neighbors receive as a result of 40 West's assistance in completing and sending applications to the BGE Office of Home Energy Programs (OHEP).

Donors and Volunteers: Icons of Help and Hope

Client Choice

As we emerge from three years of pandemic and endemic, 40 West, as of January 23, 2023, is returning to Client Choice. During the pandemic, to ensure the safety of clients and volunteers alike, clients received food that was prepacked in bags. They had no choice in the food they received. Now that we are emerging from the pandemic, the 40 West Board of Directors has approved returning to Client Choice, which allows clients to take home food they've selected.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day Food Drive

On the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Day of Service, dozens of volunteers collected food donations, weighed them, checked "use by" dates, sorted, boxed, and stored the donated food. St. Bartholomew's Outreach Committee coordinated the distribution of donation bags, planned collection routes, and recruited volunteers to collect food. 40 West Assistance and Referral volunteers, St. Bartholomew volunteers, as well as 9 volunteers who responded to Amanda Harris' post on Volunteer Match processed the donations when they arrived at 40 West. A volunteer from Mount St. Joseph High School also helped. With the leadership and coordinating efforts of David Mountain, Amanda Harris, and Glorius Sullivan, donors and volunteers added 2,573 pounds of food to 40 West's inventory. This one day total equals 43% of the total food donations received in all of 2022! This impressive total significantly enhances 40 West's ability to serve our neighbors.

40 West also received a cash donation of \$125.

Susan Lundin deserves a special thanks for designing the 40 West workflow for processing donations and responding to a constant stream of questions as donations poured in.

With the new payment plan, you have a choice of paying in four installments, or paying in full at the sign-up. You can also choose to have it delivered every other week, purchase extras, put your box on hold, or move it to another week if needed. And the CSA will also offer other specials during the season.

Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) is a mutually beneficial relationship between farmers and the community in which participants provide funding for the farmer in advance in exchange for produce during the growing season. Items vary according to the season (with 30 fruits and vegetables overall). For example, greens for the whole time, strawberries and sugar snap peas in spring, tomatoes and watermelon in summer, and hard squashes in fall. Membership is accepted throughout the growing season, members who sign up after the season has begun may do so at a prorated price. If there are at least ten shares purchased at our site, One Straw Farm will provide some produce each week for a the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center).


