EXPLORING THE MATERIAL AND THE MYSTICAL: FOLLOWING JESUS INTO THE UNKNOWN

All living things explore their environment because it is how they seek opportunity and learn to identify potential threats. Humans are no exception, so we too step out into the unknown. We are hard-wired to do so. However, we are more than biology. We are also spiritual creatures, and one might imagine that we are also equipped with the instinct to explore the spiritual realm to learn about opportunities and threats in that environment. So, even though the wilderness may seem a little imposing, maybe even scary, it calls to us, both physically and spiritually. For me, this call into the wilderness is

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so strong that I've spent the last ~ 25 years engaging in and leading expeditions and trying to figure out how God is calling me to integrate those experiences with my desire to be in beloved community.

Matthew (4:1) tells us that Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. I have wondered whether temptation was the purpose, or whether temptation is always there, seeking to cheapen, to make shallow the deep communion with the divine that one feels in the wilderness—those places without "amenity." The Holy Scriptures recount more than one journey into solitude for Jesus, but this forty day experience seems to have been unique.

My experiences as an explorer of what some people would consider "extreme" environments on Earth and on Mars have been a source of deep spiritual reflection and closeness to God. Some of the places we will visit are the ocean floor in the Pacific depths, Death Valley, Antarctica, Svalbard, and off world destinations on Mars. I want to share some of them with you during Lent in our own virtual trip into the wilderness. Through images and scriptural texts, we will explore the material and the mystical experiences that await when the Holy Spirit invites us into the wilderness. And this is my way of sharing with you some of the things that have formed me as a Christian.

Paul, writing to the church in Corinth, said:

But, as it is written, "What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him"— these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God. And we speak of these things in words not taught by human wisdom but taught by the Spirit, interpreting spiritual things to those who are spiritual. 1 Cor 2:9-13

We are Jesus followers, so if he was led into the wilderness, that is where we are called to follow. And besides, it can be awesome fun.

We'll gather on Wednesdays during Lent at 7:00 pm, beginning March 8, <u>on Zoom</u> — and possibly in the Parish House.

From our reader's eye during Lent, however, let's explore her verse as a good scrub among the nooks and crannies of our souls, an opportunity to be free of inner burdens and outer behaviors we have "no room for." While Oliver rightly calls on "the trash man" to take everything, we call on God, clergy, and community to help clear us of our inner baggage. Just as Oliver's worldly goods were burned to "make more room in [her] heart for love," so, too, were palms burned for us as symbols of a Love of Life that may rise from the ashes to help us "fly" as ones truly possessing nothing more essential within than the Love of God.

Rector Search Process

Saying a "good goodbye" is a very important part of the transition to a new Rector and we had a chance to laugh, cry, dance, sing, and rise up to show our gratitude for our beloved Flo. St. B's thanks the "Triple N's" -- Nancy Nicaise, Nicete Moodie, and Rev. Neva Brown -- for their wonderful work in organizing opportunities to celebrate Flo last month. We had a powerful community conversation with Flo, a delicious coffee hour, and an outrageously fun Farewell Dinner. Thanks to everyone who was involved in making those wonderful events happen from the choir to the kitchen to set up and take down crews -as usual at St. B's a crowd of willing hands pitched in. Thanks also to everyone who contributed to our farewell gift "purse" for Flo. Your generosity should help her to fish a lot of trout streams!

We are very grateful to welcome Interim Rector Pan Conrad to St. B's. Pan will be with us as we conduct a search for a new Rector and we are thrilled to have the benefit of her presence and leadership for this next stage.

The search process for the next Rector is moving forward with guidance from search consultant The Reverend Dina van Klaveren, who has been retained by the vestry to help give us the wisdom of her experience in working with congregations who are searching for a new rector.

The search process will include two major stages.

1. Development of a parish profile:

This will be a process to gather input from as many members of the congregation as possible to help us discern what we are looking for in a new Rector. In this process, which will occur over this spring/early summer, we will be talking about our core values and priorities, what are our strengths and areas for growth. This will help us develop the profile that we will circulate to potential candidates.

We will be lead through this process by the following co-chairs of a Profile Committee – Corinne Bowmaker, Marty Clark, and Angel Jackson. Each of these leaders has too many things at St. B's to capture in a list. Angel and Corinne are past Senior Wardens, and Marty has been deeply involved in youth and Men's ministry for many years. Amanda Harris will act as a liaison between the Profile Committee and the Vestry. The Committee will be adding additional members to make sure we have a good base for reaching out and hearing the voices of as many people as possible.

2. Search Committee process:

The Search Committee will circulate the Parish Profile to potential candidates and will vet resumes, conduct interviews, consult references, etc. with a view toward providing a recommendation to the Vestry to consider. We will be lead through this process by **Patricia Daniel, Michael Mountain, and Gay Warshaw**, each of whom brings a depth of experience at St. B's that will be invaluable. This Committee also will be adding additional members to provide a faithful discernment that reflects the values of St. B's as we search for the right candidate to be St. B's new Rector.

2023 Men's Retreat at Claggett

"Storytelling, Spirituality & Shadowboxing".

Living faith in our heads, hearts, and bodies. Fundamentals for an imaginative spirituality and a deep, grounded, integrated life of faith.

Several men from St Bs attended the 2023 Men's Retreat including James Graham (also on duty as Claggett Host for the week end), Jerry Hazelwood, David Mountain and me. Holy Nativity, Pimlico, had the largest contingent including the Rev. Bill Fallowfield and our own Deidre McElroy's father.

Even though I participated in planning the Retreat, I didn't understand the topic and even felt suspicious about what we would get out of it. Without realizing what was happening, The Rev. Matt Humm, St. Paul's, Prince Frederick, pulled us into a transforming spiritual experience that I still can't even describe. He led us to experience God during the Retreat but not through persuasion or argument--He led us through a wide range of stories. He taught us and transformed us through the stories.

Rev. Matt encouraged us to craft our own stories using techniques he taught us. Through several sessions in small groups, we honed our story-telling skills. Telling our stories in small groups let us see personal or even intimate aspects about each other. Our stories of experiences and events provided ways, without directly expressing ourselves, to let each other into our lives. Rev Matt also made sure we understood how to use our new story-telling skills to "spread the good news."

Shadowboxing surprised me too. We learned boxing jabs and punches, "day and night" stretch exercises and other moves. I didn't understand that Matt was bringing us closer together in a physical and spiritual sense. He's also a fan of martial arts and worked on them while we met in small groups. I thought it was like his prayer time. Perhaps it's the way many experience inspiration while hiking in the woods.

Retreats can arouse curiosity about ourselves. I met a college Spanish instructor during the Retreat and thought I want to get back my Spanish fluency of 50

years ago. I also met an immigration expert from the Diocese who could lead me to action in place of mere passion about immigration. The Rev. Christopher Garcia, Christ Church, Port Republic, told a story about the resilience young children have but that adults loose. Then Bill Fallowfield talked about his own passions and research to vividly describe the lives of individual enslaved persons who lived and died where Claggett now thrives. Could I carry it further to inform the reparations issue?

James Ryder, Claggett's Co-Executive Director, led us on a very chilly tour of the historical barn restoration project. In a few months, the barn will have a large space for much bigger group meetings and will significantly expand the dining space -- particularly useful for large student and summer camp groups.

The Rev. Dr. Rick Laribee, Christ Church, West River, led our Healing Service Saturday night. It followed a new format, but still included private individual prayers with choice of clergy. We skipped our usual evening card game this year. It formerly supported Episcopal activities in Palestine. We still enjoyed time in the evening with singing, snacks and beverages.

The Eucharist Sunday morning serves to bring us all together and tie up what we've been learning. Before beginning the service, Rev. Matt told us the story of Isaiah's two sons. The good son who served his father and the bad son who was profligate, stunk and was furry. Through the power of his story, I saw myself in the bad son. I'm the bad brother—goofed off with pals all weekend in the country, drank a lot, ate too much, didn't care about fats and salt, didn't get enough sleep, didn't exercise, stank because I never showered, wore the same clothes all weekend [except boxers and socks], forgot about prescriptions, etc. and am furry as well. Rev. Matt was so persuasive in his story that the next morning I dreamed I was the bad son.

The Rev. Christopher read the Gospel in a personal, intimate manner that fit perfectly with the story telling techniques we had learned. We sat in a large circle and he stood in the middle. I believe he looked each of us directly in the eyes as he began, "Jesus said, 'You are the salt of the earth'". Then Rev. Matt's sermon told a story focused on the essential properties of salt including how salt serves to preserve meat and other things. Then Rev. Matt told us that Jesus calls us to preserve the Kingdom of God.

Well, maybe all Retreats should start off feeling a little dodgy and have us wonder about the substance but then build through the days and nights to end with a powerful, clear message that lingers not just in our minds but also in our hearts

Children's Word

The past 4 weeks have produced busy and fun times for the Children's Word class at St. B's! Since the start of the new year, consistently 3-5 children have been joining teachers Kobey DeVale and Steve Miller in the Undercroft right before the Gospel reading for a session that includes prayer, check-ins, a children's version of the Gospel lesson, and a craft related to that lesson. Children's Word is guided by the Spark curriculum, which follows the same lectionary schedule as our adult lessons do, though sometimes we mix it up a bit when that adult lesson is not so easily adaptable to a message for kids ages 3-7 or 8.

Major themes tackled by the Children's Word crew this month included Discipleship, Blessings (the Beatitudes), Anger and Forgiveness, and the Transfiguration. So you can see that we covered a lot of ground! Our discussion of Discipleship included shares about what it means to be invited to be a part of God's family, what it means to be a disciple, and how we can share the message of love that Jesus teaches us. To remind us of our discipleship, we cut out paper hearts and wrote our name and "Follow Jesus!" We had a lot of fun talking about Blessings

and the Beatitudes-in what ways each of is blessed, how sometimes what seems like a not-so-great thing can actually be or turn into a blessing, and how we can share our blessings with others. For this lesson, we each chose our favorite Beatitude and wrote it on a paper cut-out that we turned into a necklace. Interestingly, all the children chose "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." Next we talked about how Jesus taught his disciples-and teaches us-how to be nice to others even when they are not so nice to us. To reinforce this lesson, we decorated wooden heart door-hangers with messages of love and forgiveness. Finally,


we discussed the Transfiguration of Jesus and how the disciples learned that their friend and teacher Jesus was actually God's son! Our children decorated paper plates to share the message that we are all transformed by Jesus' love.

We were blessed to have various members of the St. B's Youth join us in Children's Word during the last month. A special shout-out to Audrey Chambers, Lex and Mark DeVale, and Phoebe Johnson for helping with crafts and keeping our children engaged. They are the best!



Gracious and Grateful: Giving and Receiving in Times of Increasing Need

As we enter the third month of 2023, our neighbors struggle with housing, utilities, and putting food on the table as prices rise while COVID protections and assistance deplete. Strengthened by volunteers giving their time and local donors sharing their wealth, the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center continues to welcome an increasing number of neighbors seeking help.

Client Food Choice

40 West Center has returned to "Client Choice." To minimize staff and client exposure to COVID-19 during the pandemic, the 40 West Center pre-bagged pantry food for distribution. Thus, our neighbors had little choice in the food they received. On January 23rd, pre-bagging of pantry food ended. Now, our neighbors can select their preferred food items. 40 West clients have expressed gratitude and have reported that they "love" the return to "Client Choice."



To enhance this welcome change in food distribution, Susan Lundin, the 40 West Food Manager, has developed food purchase strategies to maximize the purchasing power of 40 West funds. In addition, food donations from individuals and businesses in the local community continue to help 40 West offer a variety of food from which our visiting neighbors can choose. As we look towards spring, we anticipate that the need for food in our community will continue to grow. "Prices for food at home — what people buy at retailers to prepare their own meals — jumped 11.3% in January from a year earlier," reported CBS Money Watch on February 14th citing information from the Labor Department. This outpaces an 8.7% cost-of-living increase Social Security recipients received for 2023. These food price increases disproportionately impact the low income people served by 40 West. The disparity between food cost and income is likely to get worse when, in March 2023, people lose enhanced food-stamp benefits due to expiring pandemic relief.

In short, our neighbors will look to the generosity of 40 West donors and volunteers more than they have in the past three years to continue to feed themselves and their families..

Utility Costs, Turn-offs, Rent and Evictions

40 West has been receiving an increasing number of requests for assistance with utility bills. Callers have reported that they have been referred to 40 West by the Mayor's Office, DSS, and the Community Action Partnership (CAP) Centers for help. Recent calls by 40 West staff to CAP centers have resulted in wait times that extend beyond 40 minutes. Neighbors visiting 40 West for energy assistance have expressed gratitude to our staff for their assistance with submitting applications for energy assistance and helping them determine the status of their applications.

The Baltimore Sun reported on January 31, 2023, that statewide BGE issued 7,902 shutoffs in 2020; 27,846 in 2021 and 60,659 last year through October 2022. According to the Office of People's Counsel, "126,000 customers with past-due bills either did not qualify for energy assistance or did qualify but were

not getting it." 40 West has anecdotal knowledge of these trends through its interactions with our neighbors.


As of April 1st, only a 14-day notice will be required prior to turn-offs. The Office of the People's Counsel said, "We're very concerned that there will be this flood of terminations coming later in the spring, [C]ustomers are feeling the effects still of the pandemic, also of inflation and also from increased energy prices. So this is not the time to be eliminating or reducing protections for customers."

Evictions

In the past few years, 40 West has referred neighbors to the Baltimore City Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success for rental assistance and eviction prevention. That office stopped accepting applications for rental assistance from people facing eviction on February 3, 2023.

The Baltimore Banner reported on January 31, 2023 that "[t]he city has paid more than \$69 million to assist nearly 13,000 households. [....] The remaining funds will be almost entirely spent by mid-March. But it will satisfy only a small fraction of the more than 8,000 applications that are currently under review."

Baltimore City residents are now turning to community organizations that provide rental assistance such as the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center. However, community organization funding is insufficient to meet the need. Often neighbors find themselves being referred from one community organization to another.



The Baltimore Banner report goes on to say that "[e]victions have increased rapidly in Baltimore City. In Baltimore, evictions this past September and November surpassed the 2019 tallies for those months, according to data provided by the Baltimore City Sheriff's Office."

There is no immediate relief for those facing eviction in Gov. Wes Moore's \$63.1 billion budget released in January.

Gracious and Grateful

Neighbors visiting the 40 West Assistance Referral Center for help continue to be thankful for both the assistance and the referrals; however, one can easily sense among those needing help with utilities and rent their worries about an uncertain future.

40 West and its neighbors thank the many dedicated volunteers, generous donors and capable partners that help 40 West carry out its mission. Yet, the need is great. With the new payment plan, you have a choice of paying in four installments, or paying in full at the sign-up. You can also choose to have it delivered every other week, purchase extras, put your box on hold, or move it to another week if needed. And the CSA will also offer other specials during the season.

Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) is a mutually beneficial relationship between farmers and the community in which participants provide funding for the farmer in advance in exchange for produce during the growing season. Items vary according to the season (with 30 fruits and vegetables overall). For example, greens for the whole time, strawberries and sugar snap peas in spring, tomatoes and watermelon in summer, and hard squashes in fall. Membership is accepted throughout the growing season, members who sign up after the season has begun may do so at a prorated price. If there are at least ten shares purchased at our site, One Straw Farm will provide some produce each week for a the 40 West Assistance and Referral Center).
