



Coordinated Middle Neighborhood Strategy



Wealth Building(DHCD)

- 1. Up to \$30,000 for home repairs to legacy homeowners, homeowners that have lived in their homes for 15 or more years.
- 2. Up to \$10,000 for any homeowner for exterior improvements.

INSPIRE (DOP)

Targeting grants to existing homeowners for home improvements and homeownership opportunities to families with school-aged children

CDC Organizing Support (DOP)

Training and technical assistance, placemaking grants, organizing support for four CDCs

Buy Back the Block (Live Baltimore)

- •Up to 270 grants to eligible homebuyers
- •\$10,000 to residents who buy where they currently rent
- •\$20,000 to residents who buy where they currently rent and renovate

HNI

Operating support, block projects, access to loans

Of all 146 middle neighborhoods, ARPA dollars will target 26 neighborhoods in 5 focus areas and with the coordinated strategy up to 46 neighborhoods

opportunities created by the granting of Middle Neighborhood status to a key set of neighborhoods

- Secure private and public funding for recruitment of staff under Middle Neighborhood and State Operating Assistance Grants
- Compete for State Community Legacy Grant for vacant property project
- Seek site control for stabilization of 6 city-owned vacant homes in Allendale/Edgewood area
- Continue development of resident and property ownership information in City target area (Edgewood, Allendale, Edmondson Village and Rognel Heights) to support Buy Back the Block program)
- Seek Inclusion in Uplands redevelopment for Buy Back the Block renters and first-time buyer other incentives
- Engage Community School Coordinators in outreach to renters for Buy Back the Block
